



Case Statement

Communities across the country last conducted point-in-time homeless counts in January 2019. The Monterey County homeless census was conducted on January 31. It identified 2,422 homeless individuals in Monterey County. Only 592 of these individuals were sheltered. There were 848 women and 156 families with 596 members. More than half the families were unsheltered on the day of the count.

These censuses are generally considered an undercount of homelessness due to the methodology used. In addition, a growth in homelessness has been observed during the COVID-19 pandemic.

On January 19, 2021, Community Human Services opened Casa de Noche Buena in Seaside – the Monterey Peninsula's first homeless shelter for single women and families with children. The shelter provides safe, warm lodgings, meals, and a host of supportive services provided by case managers on site, including housing navigation, assistance with employment and education, enrollment in mainstream benefits programs, linkages to health, mental health and substance abuse services and recreational activities.

In the first 4 hours that we began accepting applications we received calls from 21 families and 31 single women – more than triple what we could serve under COVID protocols. There are currently 229 people on the waiting list. Since opening our doors, we have served 41 guests. Twenty-seven have exited the shelter – 70% to permanent or transitional housing. Our service model works!

Community Human Services will duplicate this success with a second shelter for women and families in Monterey – Shuman HeartHouse. The Shuman Family of Carmel has generously donated \$3.1M to purchase a building at 600 E. Franklin Street for this purpose and will also cover architect and engineering fees. The building is ideal; it is zoned for a shelter, requires no use permit, has ample water credits, is within walking distance to many amenities, and is near bus lines. It was recently renovated and is in beautiful condition, but needs additional modifications such as bathrooms, a commercial kitchen, a laundry room and sleeping quarters to function as a shelter.

The Shuman's have made a remarkable lead gift. It is now vital that we raise an additional \$3.23M for building renovations, one-time startup costs (furnishings and equipment), and first year operating expenses. Donors will receive recognition, have opportunities for naming rights and be entitled to tax benefits as allowed by the IRS. The Donor's Story

Food and shelter are basic needs for all people. For decades, our family has focused on investing in community through food and shelter, whether it be through business endeavors or nonprofit impact. As a developer by career, I have an understanding and appreciation for the impact housing has on entire communities. My wife Adriana has a diverse background and passion for sustainable foods, food supply chains, and the impact food choices have on the health of individuals, communities and the environment. Together, we have committed part of our life work to giving back to the communities in which we live and work. Our family foundation has always supported the environment, homelessness and at-risk families and children. Giving back to the community is important to us, and it sets an example for our daughter. She has always been involved in some way, whether through conversations or hands-on work.

Shortly after our family of three moved to the Monterey Peninsula, I saw the need for a homeless shelter. I have always wanted to open a shelter for women and families experiencing homelessness. In 2013, while trying to locate a local shelter to support, I came to find out that there weren't any shelters for women or families in Monterey. My passion and commitment grew stronger as I searched for shelters. I came across the nonprofit organization Gathering for Women which provides food and many services for women, although no housing.

While Gathering for Women demonstrated strength in providing day center services, the most difficult thing for me was to see the women leave after they had received all these great services and support. At the end of the day, they had to go find a place to sleep outside or in their car. This continued to affect me to my core.



Through our work with Gathering for Women, we learned about Casa De Noche Buena, a shelter being built in Seaside to serve women and families. Casa De Nocha Buena was established through a partnership between Community Human Services (CHS) and Gathering for Women with CHS taking the lead. I joined the committee and helped with the development and construction process for this first shelter for women and families on the Monterey Peninsula. This opportunity was impactful





and enlightening. It was joyous, yet it didn't satisfy my bigger vision of having a shelter in Monterey. A new spark was ignited after Casa De Nocha Buena was launched.

It has always been my vision to have a shelter in Monterey where there is so much need but so many constraints due to lack of water and lack of appropriate buildings and building sites. For years, I have tried to find a building in Monterey. I have looked endlessly. In 2020, I finally came across property on Franklin Street that was perfect for what I had envisioned! I knew it was my job to make this happen. Because of my family's prior experience with and commitment to Casa De Noche Buena, I knew Community Human Services would be the perfect partner to make my vision a reality.

Community Human Services is the perfect fit for managing this new Monterey shelter. I know CHS has the experience and the know-how to help make this happen. Their proven track record of managing finances and successfully operating various types of shelters and residential treatment facilities is evident to me. They are the right choice for my investment.

Gratefully, Community Human Services responded willingly to my request for a meeting to partner in my vision. After a few meetings we were able to figure out a plan to make my dream of a shelter for women and families in Monterey a reality. Community Human Services agreed to accept my donation to purchase the building and provide some additional start up monies to get the project going. It was one of the happiest days of my life! And now the fun begins, getting the shelter built and operable as soon as possible.

The launch of the capital campaign will be the catalyst for the community to become part of this project. Our community will play a vital role in the lives of each person that is touched and served by this shelter through Community Human Services. I am eager, and I hope others will be inspired to join in this effort. The quicker construction begins, the sooner women and families will be off the streets and safely housed.

It's going to be an incredible journey and a huge asset to our community. Together, as a community, we can make it happen.

Building Description

Shuman HeartHouse will be located at 600 E. Franklin Street in Monterey. It is situated one block from the beach between the Monterey Sports Center and Lake El Estero.

The historic property was built in 1930 as the Union Ice Factory and is currently home to the Arthur Murray Dance Studio. The property consists of two buildings totaling 6,340 square feet on two large lots totaling 23,589 square feet and is fully gated. A recent major renovation left the building in excellent condition.

The larger main building will be used for the shelter. The smaller building will provide three offices and a restroom for shelter staff and staff from other agencies serving homeless women and families, such as public health nurses, benefits eligibility workers, social workers, and school district liaisons.

Shuman HeartHouse will provide up to 35 shelter beds for women and families with children, depending on the size of the families. There will be 16 bedrooms for women (private carrels with 6' walls) and 4 large family bedrooms.

Other facility features will include a commercial kitchen, multi-purpose dining/classroom, computer/playroom, staff office, lobby with front desk and monitoring station, laundry room, women's bathroom, family bathroom, patio area, and two additional half-bathrooms.

Two of the most difficult project development challenges on the have already been achieved:

- ✓ <u>Water Credits</u>: The property has sufficient water credits for the proposed use plus additional credits for future development on the site.
- ✓ <u>Zoning Approval</u>: The property is located in the "Emergency Shelter Overlay Zone" approved by the City of Monterey and, therefore, does not require a conditional use permit.

The projected cost of capital improvements is \$5,574,405. Construction is slated for 2022 with the shelter opening in early 2023.










Floorplan
